- 1 All judges of the Trial Division are *ex officio* members of the Court of Appeal and *vice versa*, *Federal Court Act*, s. 5. In practice, it is rare for Trial Division judges to sit on the Court of Appeal.

- 3 Two different judges of the Superior Court have occupied the full time position since 1995.
